# **PSYCHOLOGICALS**



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This hunt is themed around the 12 Days of Christmas, Christmas Day and Cold Christmas. The best known English version of 12 Days of Christmas was first printed in "Mirth without Mischief", a children's book published in London around 1780. The work was heavily illustrated with woodcuts, attributed in one source to **Thomas Bewick**. He is one of the seven swans on page 6

Our team had pencilled in Cold Christmas as a possible location for the treasure during the Advent Calendar period, but despite decoding various confirmers we were unable to find the treasure either on Christmas Day or two subsequent visits.

The 12 small pictures (same number as days of Christmas) are all December events. Details taken from wiki pages

- 1. <u>8/12/1992</u> The Galileo spacecraft flies past Earth for the **first** time. (first <u>False-colour composite image of the moon</u> taken by its telescope.)
- 2. <u>1/12/1955</u> **First** Lady of Civil Rights: seamstress Rosa Parks refuses to give up her bus seat to a white man and is arrested for violating the city's racial segregation laws, an incident which leads to that city's bus boycott. Photo is from Dr Who episode "Rosa".
- 3. <u>16/12/1653</u> English Interregnum: The Protectorate: Oliver Cromwell becomes **First** Lord Protector of the Commonwealth of England, Scotland and Ireland. (Cromwell banned Christmas)
- 16/12/1773 American Revolution: <u>Boston Tea Party</u>. In the **first** major act of defiance to British rule over the colonists, members of the Sons of Liberty dressed as Mohawk Indians dump hundreds of crates of tea into Boston harbour as a protest against the Tea Act
- 5. <u>25/12/1066</u> <u>William Conqueror</u>, Duke of Normandy is crowned **first** Norman king of England, at Westminster Abbey, London. (Bayeux Tapestry).
- 6. <u>8/12/1990</u> The Galileo spacecraft flies past Earth for the **first** time. (Ozone hole over south pole taken by Galileo telescope.)
- 7. <u>21/12/1913</u> Arthur Wynne's <u>"word-cross"</u>, the **first** crossword puzzle, is published in the New York World.
- 8. <u>14/12/1911 Roald Amundsen's team</u>, comprising himself, Olav Bjaaland, Helmer Hanssen, Sverre Hassel, and Oscar Wisting, becomes the **first** to reach the South Pole.
- 9. <u>20/12/1989 General Colin Powell</u> briefs reporters at the Pentagon about the **first** day of the United States invasion of Panama to depose Panama's General Manuel Antonio Noriega from power and bring him to the U.S. for trial on drug charges.
- 10. <u>9/12/1960 First Episode of Coronation Street</u>, the world's longest-running television soap opera, is broadcast in the United Kingdom.
- 11. <u>14/12/1918</u> The United Kingdom general election occurs, the **first** where women were allowed to vote. (Woman's Suffrage).
- 12. <u>7/12/1995</u> The Galileo spacecraft is **first** to orbit Jupiter, a little more than six years after it was launched by Space Shuttle Atlantis during Mission STS-34.

#### Alphabetic positions of day in December spell **HAPPY HUNTING**

<u>The big image</u> is from the 1983 movie "<u>A Christmas Story</u>": The 1935 on the calendar has been added in. The speech balloon character is Ralphie Parker played by Peter Billingsley.

The first part of the line below the film picture is a lyric in the song "It's a Hard-knock Life" from the musical Annie.


When you're in an orphanage

In 1934 the Ovaltine company sponsored the radio program Little Orphan Annie. The show's fan club, "Radio Orphan Annie's Secret Society", distributed a members' handbook that included a simple substitution cipher with a resulting numeric cipher text.



Directed by Bob Clark "A Christmas Story" was based on radio personality/writer Jean Shepard's stories about his childhood growing up during the 1930s. It follows nine-year-old Ralphie Parker in the weeks leading up to Christmas in some unnamed year in the late 1930s/early 1940s as Ralphie tries to convince his parents to get him his dream present, the Red Ryder Carbine Action 200-shot Range Model air rifle, despite everyone warning him that "you'll shoot your eye out". While Ralphie's quest for the air rifle is the driving narrative of the film, the movie includes a sequence where young Ralphie finally becomes a member of the Radio Orphan Annie's Secret Society, a fan club of the Little Orphan Annie radio program. At the end of the latest episode of the show, Ralphie is told to set the outer ring to B=2 in order to decode the secret message from Annie to her fans. He is disappointed when he learns that the important "secret message" is "Be sure to drink your Ovaltine." Ralphie had to drink so much Ovaltine to collect enough labels to

join Annie's secret circle that he had grown sick of the product, so he was particularly disappointed to learn about the "commercialisation of his favourite show".



Ralphie never actually receives a secret decoder ring, mostly because secret decoder rings did not exist! In the film, it is actually a secret decoder **badge** that he sends away for. In 1935 the first Orphan Annie decoder badge was introduced by Ovaltine. It was a small round badge with the year and "Radio Orphan Annie's SS" and two crossed skeleton keys. The "SS" stood for "Secret Society."

Setting B=2 on the badge, gives the substitution 1-26: NBLYOKCQXJDRWIESVHGTFUPAMZ and Ralphie's speech balloon numbers decode to **DUE FOR MY NIGHTCAP?**

#### December 3 Christmas Common

Image is the <u>Fox and Hounds</u>, <u>Christmas Common</u>, Watlington, Oxfordshire which became a temporary Polling Station on 8<sup>th</sup> June 2017. Christmas Common was the location of the first ATH (Logica) in 1985 and the starting point for the final leg of the 2005 ATH hidden on Watlington Hill.



#### December 4 Christmas Pie



Top image is a map of Normandy. Middle image is an inverted Ford Flex (used by Mark Wahlberg in the 2017 film "Daddy's Home 2"). Inverted, Ford Flex becomes Flexford which is a village in Surrey just South of another named Normandy. (Flexford was once called Flaxford, itself a corruption of "flax vard", meaning flax meadows by a stream). South of these two (as indicated by the red marker pin) is

a village named Christmas Pie. Christmas Pie owes its curious name to property owned by a prominent local family named Christmas. There are many references to this family in the court records of the manor of Cleygate which date back to 1513 in the reign of King Henry VIII. Christmases are often noted as serving as members of the homage which was the jury of the court. The "Pie" comes from the Saxon term "pightel" or "pightle" meaning a small piece of arable land. Until it was built up during the 1920s, Pie Field was a small field near the Christmas Pie crossroads.



#### December 5 Christmas Steps



Top Image is pop group Steps performing live on their Christmas with Steps tour at the Manchester Apollo in December 2012. Bottom image is from a Bristol Solitaire video. Christmas Steps is a street in Bristol. Originally called Queene Street after the 1574 visit of Queen Elizabeth 1st to Bristol, it became Christmas Steps in the mid 19th century. This was probably down to simply being referred by locals due to being next door to Christmas Street, formerly known as Knyfesmyth Street, after the tradesmen there. The Middle English pronunciation of Knyfesmyth, with the K sounded, may be the origin of the street's modern name, Christmas simply being a corruption of Knife-Smith. An alternative less likely theory is that it is based on the nativity scene found in a stained glass window of The Chapel of the Three Kings of Cologne, which stands at the top of the steps.

#### December 6 Christmas Tree Farm




On 27 December 1831, English Naturalist <u>Charles Darwin</u> set off on HMS Beagle on a 5-year world-wide voyage on surveying flora and fauna. One of his discoveries were the

Galapagos Islands where he and his crew ate the local giant tortoises. HMS Beagle's voyage featured in the 2015 ATH hunt. Darwin lived at Down House, Down, Kent (renamed Downe in the 1940s to avoid confusion with County Down). Christmas Tree Farm is located in Downe and includes Rheas amongst the various animals that can be fed by visitors.



#### December 7 Cold Christmas

The formula is Isaac Newton's Law of Cooling. To refine it, Newton needed a temperature scale so devised his own "Newton Scale". His lowest point (0) was defined as "the heat of air in winter at which water begins to freeze. This point may be accurately determined by pressing the thermometer into melting snow." itor could be "in the old reckoning" (of time) and HBTM stands for "Happy Birthday To Me". Newton would have said his birthday was December 25 1642 (Christmas Day), but everywhere outside of England he was born on January 4 1643 due to the fact that England was in the midst of a 150-year period of using a different reckoning calendar from the rest of Europe when he was born (Julian / Old Style => Gregorian / New Style).





**Cold Christmas** is a hamlet East of Thundridge, Hertfordshire. About 0.5 miles NW are the ruins of St

Mary and All Saints church which was built on a private estate in 1086 and demolished in 1853, possible because it is built on the wrong alignment (North to South). It is purportedly a sign of the devil and the most haunted church in England. It is believed it (and subsequently the hamlet) was named Cold Christmas church because a lot of the graves belong mainly to young children whose lives were lost around Christmas time because of a very cold winter.

#### December 8 Natal

The letter pairs are <u>ISO Alpha-2 Country Codes</u> for Mexico, Cameroon, Ghana, USA, Japan, Greece, Italy, and Uruguay. These are the eight countries and scores of the first round group matches played in the <u>Arenadas Dunas</u> in the city of <u>Natal</u> for the <u>2014 FIFA World Cup</u> in Brazil. They were the only matches that the stadium hosted for that competition. Natal means <u>Christmas</u> in Portuguese. Natal <u>Founded 25 December 1599</u>



#### December 9 Partridge Road & Pear Tree Mead

The card identifies the Christmas carol "The Twelve Days of Christmas". The cumulative total of gifts



received after each day are the first 12 tetrahedral numbers 1, 4, 10, 20, 35, 56, 84, 120, 165, 220, 286, 364. The date on the card is the first day of Christmas on which day "my true love" (= sweetheart) sent "a partridge in a pear tree". The fonts are Segoe and Harlow Solid SB. Partridge Road and Pear Tree Mead are streets in Harlow, Essex.



#### December 10 The Partridge in Peartree Green

The green finger-post references the Periodic Table:- 5=Boron=B, S=Sulfur=16, Sc=Scandium=21,



Br=Bromine=35. Together these give roads B2135 and B2116 which intersect at **The Partridge** PH in **Partridge Green**, Horsham.

The <u>Life Std Roman</u> font of "d.1884" on the gravestone plus the Greek letter  $\Pi$  refer to "<u>Life of Pi</u>" by Yann Martel. He named the shipwrecked Bengal tiger Richard Parker inspired by a cabin boy

named Richard Parker (RP) in the legal case R v Dudley and Stephens who is cannibalised in a lifeboat in July 1884. Richard's gravestone is in Jesus Chapel (aka Peartree Church), **Peartree Green**, Southampton. Martel also had another Richard Parker in mind - a mutineer in Edgar Allan Poe's nautical adventure novel "The Narrative of Arthur Gordon Pym of Nantucket" (used in ATH 2020) who is stranded and eventually cannibalised on the hull of an overturned ship. There is a dog aboard who is named Tiger.

These three words border the 8 x 8 square, effectively cutting it off from the rest of the wordsearch. The square contains the words

MOLECULAR GASTRONOMY NOUVELLE CUISINE CORDON BLEU VEGAN interspersed with WHERE WAS CLUE TWO.

In Treasure Quest Clue 2 was hidden **in a pear tree** in the Bishop's Garden, Norwich. Radio Norfolk - Alan Partridge has a Norfolk connection

#### Unused letters read:

KNOWING ME AND KNOWING YOU AHA YOU'VE FOUND A CLUE BUT ALAS YOUR HOPES WE DASH IT WON'T HELP YOU FIND THE CACHE.

House number 16 on Cold Christmas Lane in Thundridge has a monkey puzzle tree in the front garden. CHILLY PINE in wordsearch, a thematic play on the Chile Pine the alternative name for the monkey puzzle tree. The number is no longer on the fence nor the house, but some neighbours have numbers on their sheds or fences, so it's possible to work it out. The fence looks brand new, probably just a few weeks/months old probably erected after the puzzle was created. Streetview images still show the original fence.




# Page 3 – 5 Golden Rings - In Memoriam to James Medhurst



The four bells on the green puzzle say Ag 47. Silver (Argentum) has atomic number 47. Along with the 4 cockle-shells, this links to the nursery rhyme Mary, Mary, quite contrary ("pretty maids all in a row")

The gravestones (ODNB = Oxford Dictionary of National Biography) are the death dates of the "Queen's Maries" The Queen's Maries (act. 1548–1567), were four small girls chosen to be <u>maids</u> of honour to five-year-old Mary, Queen of Scots, when she was sent to France in 1548 as the fiancée of the dauphin François. All four came from well-known Scottish families with royal connections.

#### The 3 card pictures are:

- a yum yum doughnut (mmmm)



#### **Arrowed Pictures**

These represent <u>Six Degrees of Kevin Bacon</u>. This is a parlour game where players challenge each other to arbitrarily choose an actor and then connect them to another actor via a film that both actors have appeared in together, repeating this process to try and find the shortest path that ultimately leads to prolific American actor Kevin Bacon. It rests on the assumption that anyone involved in the Hollywood film industry can be linked through their film roles to Bacon within six steps. The game's name is a reference to "six degrees of separation", a concept which posits that any two people on Earth are six or fewer acquaintance links apart.

The thermometer shows 6 degrees Celsius and says "Made in Philadelphia" at the bottom, and Kevin Bacon was born in Philadelphia.

T9 is the keypad text prediction system used on mobile phones which decodes the 4 Calling Birds ciphers

Neil Peart of Rush - 4th best according to Rolling Stone magazine. Charlie Watts was the drummer of The Rolling Stones. The two entities are unrelated - both took their names from a blues song 'Rollin' Stone' by Muddy Waters, released in 1950.

3. That guy who put on a show at the Christmas dance, along with his strange relatives.

Orsino Thruston Weird Sisters. The Weird Sisters are a wizarding rock band. They are booked by Dumbledore to play at Hogwarts during the Yule Ball (*Christmas dance*). In Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire they are described as "all extremely hairy and dressed in black robes that had been artfully ripped and torn." In the film version of Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire they perform three songs (all composed by Cocker): "Do the Hippogriff", "This Is the Night" and "Magic Works". They were played by real-life musicians: According to Wizards of the Coast Famous Wizard cards the members are:

The term Weird Sisters is also used in William Shakespeare's play Macbeth to describe the three witches, and more closely contemporaneous with the Harry Potter novels, in Terry Pratchett's Discworld Cycle. Orsino is a character in "Twelfth Night", another Christmas connection.

4. That guy who used his voice training in an animated way.

Ringo Starr of The Beatles. He narrated the first two animated series of Thomas the Tank Engine (train).

5. <u>That haymaker guy who sounds like he is related to Erica. I could tell from his eyes that he was a dreamer.</u>
<u>Eric Carr</u> of Kiss. Hit his drums very hard and name sounds like Erica. He wore fox make-up when playing. <u>Dreamer</u> is a fox cub in The Animals of Farthing Wood

6. That topless guy who might bite. He previously worked with McFly.

<u>Frank Beard</u> of **ZZ** Top played on <u>'Back to the Future III'</u> (character named Marty McFly) the Drummer is 'Frank Beard' who doesn't wear a hat like the other two (topless). Beard was a member of a fake version of the British band the Zombies (might bite)



The word "poule" appears three times among the word salad, in blue, white and red. The little pictures of chickens are also in blue, white and red, like the French flag. So this is the "three French hens". The blue chicken is a previous <u>artwork on the 4th Plinth at Trafalgar Square</u>. The white chicken is a nesting hen dish, probably to hold eggs. The red chicken is a fancy dress costume:

Drawing a vertical line separates the three groups of words. Then read each set in order, across and down.



Non, un oeuf ne suffit pas. Cette poule a battu tous les records il y a cent ans = No, one egg is not enough. This hen broke all the records a hundred years ago. The Austalorp comes from Australia, and broke world records in the 1920s by laying over 300 eggs.

Il vaudrait mieux se couvrir les morsures, dans la région d'origine de cette poule = It would be better to cover up to avoid bites, in the region of origin of this hen. The Naked Neck (aka Turken) comes from **Transylvania**, Romania, and literally has a bare neck with no feathers.

# Page 10 – 2 Turtle Doves, 7 Swans a-swimming

#### Questions

These are about events that happened on Christmas Day and are in date order.

Blue letter questions are about the Cold War. Red letter questions are about "The Hot War" trilogy by Harry Turtledove




The <u>Cold War</u> was a period of geopolitical tension between the United States and the Soviet Union and their respective allies, the Western Bloc and the Eastern Bloc, which began following World War II. Historians do not fully agree on its starting and ending points, but the period is generally considered to span the 1947 Truman Doctrine (12 March 1947) to the 1991 Dissolution of the Soviet Union (26 December 1991)

- 1. This operation was organised by a nut; it was a miracle it worked. The Hungnam evacuation aka The Miracle of Christmas was the evacuation of United Nations (UN) forces and North Korean civilians from the port of Hungnam, North Korea, between 15 and 24 December 1950 during the Korean War. It was organised by US X Corps commander General Edward Almond (nut) 2. But what if there was no miracle? In Harry Turtledove's "The Hot War" alternate history series, which starts with "Bomb's Away" during the Korean war, there is no miracle evacuation of American troops at Hungnam, and the Chinese encircle and eventually destroy the Americans.
- 3. A capital city was destroyed, as was a small town visited by a treasure hunter. Later in first book, Norwich is destroyed on 1st Feb 1951 In Harry **Turtledove's** second book "Fallout", Washington DC is destroyed (May 1952) as is the town of Fakenham (11 Sep 1951). Fakenham was visited by the Treasure Hunter Becky Betts on Treasure Quest. (page 1 Wordsearch.)
- 4. This British Bikini had a particularly devastating effect. **Christmas Island**, Kiritimati, <u>nuclear weapons tests</u>, November 1957 (Grapple X test)
- 5. A test concerning particle physics marked F for the last time, before having to move underground 25th December, 1962 The Soviet Union conducts its final above-ground nuclear weapon test at "NZ Area C, Sukhoy Nos, Novaya Zemlya, Russia. 6. 51 years after an England v Germany football match, the President tried to play fair, but it didn't last long. 25th December 1965, Lyndon B. Johnson pauses bombing of North Vietnam (the football game was played during the Christmas Truce in World War 1)
- 7. They chose a target with three consecutive letters, so others refused to join in with their games. 25th December 1979 Russia invaded a **FGH**anistan. Many countries boycotted the 1980 Moscow Olympics.
- 8. Octavian was one of three who dispensed with a chemist and her husband. 25th December 1989 Execution of Nicolai Ceausescu and his wife (chemistry researcher). Octavian was one of a 3 man firing squad.
- 9. Boris led the country into a new era as it left the Union. 25th December 1991 Boris Yeltsin becomes first president of Russian Federation, dissolution of the Soviet Union
- H.N. Turtletaub is a nom de plume used by Harry Turtledove for five historical novels. (Turteltaub is German for Turtledove).
- Jon Turteltaub directed the National Treasure films. Sean Bean was in the first one.
- A "Christmas tree" was a type of alert area constructed by the United States Air Force for the Strategic Air Command (SAC) during the Cold War.

#### Maps

The map of Great Britain is wearing a red and white scarf along the Central Belt of Scotland. The blue pins are at locations with a "cold" sounding name. Their first letters are an anagram of SCARF.

- The <u>wind barb symbol</u> stands for 25 knots. The wind direction is approximately SW, i.e. it's a cold wind from the NE. The symbol points to a town called Beaufort west of Abergavenny. Beaufort is a unit of wind force. 25 knots 25th December? and Beaufort cipher which numbers the letters 0-25
- The black arrow points at Aberdeenshire, approximately at Peterhead.
- The green areas in the North Sea are oil fields: Hutton, Brent, Piper and Nelson. The dotted vertical line is the Prime Meridian, the top half of the map has been pushed to the west by about 2 degrees. The black arrow with the 90 degree bend indicates that the top half of the map needs to be moved east and then north a bit to get the correct layout. The Piper field has an O against it which has to link to a mapper. Most-likely Abraham Ortelius or John Ogilby
- The "pm?" in the map on the top right is at Aberdeen City. pm stands for Prime Minister and links to Lord George Hamilton-Gordon, 4th earl of Aberdeen (1852–55) (aka Lord Haddo).

The cipher below the maps on the top right is Beaufort with the key being "SCARF". Beaufort scale is the link to the wind speed symbol.

The numbers at the bottom are translated into letters: bejzpdapdaiwpeyhejgoejpdamqaopekjooetzwpaokjalhwyapskxenzo then by a Caesar shift of 4: FIND THE THEMATIC LINKS IN THE QUESTIONS. SIX DATES, ONE PLACE, TWO BIRDS.

The themes are **Christmas**, **Cold** & Hot War; the six dates are 25th December; the place is Kiritimati, **Christmas** Island; the two birds are the **Two Turtledoves**.

#### Find X and Y

- There are 25 different uppercase letters in the statement (no uppercase O).
- The L on the Norway coast map identifies that L = Norway (but could also be a weather symbol for a low pressure system, suggesting a cold wind from the north east.).

The tundra swan (Cygnus columbianus) is a small swan of the Holarctic. The two taxa within it are usually regarded as conspecific, but are also sometimes split into two species: Bewick's swan (Cygnus bewickii) of the Palaearctic and the whistling swan (C. columbianus) proper of the Nearctic. Birds from eastern Russia (roughly east of the Taymyr Peninsula) are sometimes separated as the subspecies C. c. jankowskii, but this is not widely accepted as distinct, with most authors including them in C. c. bewickii. Tundra swans are sometimes separated in the subgenus Olor together with the other Arctic swan species.

Bewick's swan was named in 1830 by William Yarrell after the engraver Thomas Bewick, who specialised in illustrations of birds and animals. Cygnus is the Latin for "swan", and columbianus comes from the Columbia River, the type locality.





This physical version was created in 2013. According to the sign accompanying it, 'the concept was to mark the distance of the work from itself along a North/South axis'. The distance shown on the sign, 24,859 miles, is the average polar circumference of the Earth.

The words with the pictures makes a sentence containing the Meridian countries. (Burkina Faso and Antarctica missing)




